Arson Detection as a First Responder

The motives for committing arson are varied and oftentimes, complex. But whether the arsonist does it for profit, or to instill fear, or due to a mental disorder, or out of sheer curiosity, the motives may not be as important as the means.

While it is an arson investigator's job to analyze the fire scene, it is often a first responder's keen eye that brings them to the scene in the first place. Knowing what clues may reveal themselves in the aftermath of an arson fire can lead to the prosecution

of dangerous criminals and scofflaws.

Recognizing a point of origin, signs of accelerant, and the subtle differences in other indicators can help a fire fighter distinguish fires that are set accidentally and those that are set purposefully.

The loss of life and property due to arson is a burden to the fire service and the community as a whole. Educating fire fighters to the evidence that points to arson is the first step to stopping these offenders from causing future damage.
